CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: Introductory Cree II is a continuation of a general introduction to Plains Cree (Y dialect) grammar, and vocabulary with an emphasis in the practice in speaking and working in the language laboratory.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: Students will be able to comprehend simple sentences written in Roman Orthography, through their knowledge of vocabulary, word agreement, word order and association. Students will also be able to interpret and write in Cree Syllabics. Individual projects will be done both in written and presented orally in class. There will be in class and some take home assignments throughout this term. Often the structure is provided for you through class lectures. Attendance and participation are very important in this course. Students will not be allowed to reschedule missed quizzes or assignments unless they provide a valid reason. This course will provide preparation for the intermediate Cree NS153.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: As a result of taking this course, students will gain the abilities to:

- demonstrate and understand simple sentences written in Roman Orthography, and Cree Syllabics through their knowledge gained of the vocabulary, word agreement word order and association.
- recognize words written in Roman Orthography.
- identify and incorporate Cree words into simple sentences by translating them into English.
- demonstrate basic level understanding of the Cree language
- apply and evaluate their knowledge of basic terms written and spoken in Cree.

Important Note on Assignments: Deadlines for assignments will be strictly observed. All assignments are due at the beginning of class on the date they are due. Projects:

Students will complete three projects:

1. A presentation on a topic about Cree Culture or Language;

Guest Speakers: Upon availability and time permitting.

Quizzes: Attendance is imperative as quizzes are given a high percentage in final grading of the course.
