"It was very cool. It is not often people can say they went to school and graduated with their dad," said Deanna.

GPRC's reputation for excellent instructors and a quality motorcycle program initially drew the father-daughter duo from their home in Stony Plain to Fairview.

"It was great, I feel very proud," said David after the pair's Convocation. Not many people get to go through an apprenticeship or college program with their child." 
Shaylene Syrota, who received her Animal Health Technologist diploma delivered the Student Address.

2016 AWARD OF DISTINCTION

Michael O'Connor is the 2016 Award of Distinction recipient. The Award of Distinction is the College's highest tribute to honour individuals who have made exceptional contributions to our community and to the advancement of higher education.

Michael O'Connor served as a member of the GPRC Board of Governors starting in 2002 and became board chair in 2008.

"That was a pivotal time for the College and Michael worked tirelessly for the College often putting the needs and interests of the College ahead of his own and set the College on the solid track it is on now," said current Board of Governors Chair Pete Merlo.

O'Connor moved to Grande Prairie in 1973 initially working at Proctor and Gamble. In 1978 he pursued a career in the construction industry. In 1985 he established Mike O'Connor Construction and in 1993 joined with Cliff Turner to launch what's now known as TurCon Construction Group.

All the while O'Connor has been active in the community as a volunteer with numerous community groups including Grande Prairie Live Theatre, Camp Tamarack, Alberta Wine Education Society, Grande Prairie and District Chamber of Commerce, Alberta Chambers of Commerce, Swan City Rotary Club, Crystal Centre Advisory Committee and the Christ Church Anglican vestry.

2016 DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

GPRC honours a ground-breaking alumnae in **Dr. Dana Goedbloed** with the Distinguished Alumni Award. The award honours outstanding accomplishments in an individual's profession, service to the community, to society, or to GPRC.

Goedbloed graduated from GPRC in 1975 with a certificate in Secretarial Science. She later went on to earn her Bachelor of Education and Masters of Education degrees. She eventually completed her PhD in Policy and Leadership at UBC.

In 2008, Goedbloed's career took her to Kwantlen College in BC where she became the first female Dean of Apprenticeships in Canada.

2016 STEPS TO THE GREATER ALUMNI AWARD


GPRC presents the Steps to the Greater Alumni Award to a former student in recognition of outstanding achievements early in their careers.

This year GPRC recognized runner **Fiona Benson** who represented Canada at the 2015 World Cross Country Championships in March 2015. In July 2015 she won the Canadian Championship in the 800m. She's achieved Olympic qualifying times in both the 800m and 1500m for the 2016 Rio Olympic Games. She ended 2015 ranked 10th in the world in the one mile, 31st in the 1,500 metre, and 41st in the 800 metre.

2016 ALUMNI AWARDS OF EXCELLENCE

GPRC recognized two alumni for their accomplishments in the past year. The award recognizes specific, recent accomplishments of our Alumni such as local, national or international honours, major championships and appointments to high office.

This year's recipients include curler **Tom Sallows** and runner **Mirelle Martens.** Sallows competed at both the 2015 Tim Hortons Brier and 2015 Ford World Men's Curling Championship as a member of Team Canada. The team won the 2015 Brier and won bronze at the World's. Martens represented Canada at the 2015 World Cross Country Championships in March 2015 in the Junior Women's race. She also represented Canada in the 2015 Pan American Junior Track and Field Championships in Edmonton where she won the silver medal in the 3,000 metre with a personal best time of 9:41. Martens also won the bronze medal at the 2015 Canadian Junior Track and Field Championships in the 5000 metre.

09 Things You Need to Know About Polytechnic University

GPRC is currently talking to the provincial government about becoming a Polytechnic University. Don Gnatiuk, President and CEO of GPRC, answers nine questions about Polytechnic Universities and why it's good for students, the community and industry in our region.

Q1

Why does GPRC want to become a Polytechnic University?

The main reason GPRC is talking to its colleagues at the Government of Alberta is because our students, our community and industry in our region want GPRC to be able to grant its own degrees.

The level of economic activity and diversity of our economy makes it a challenge for businesses to attract the highly-skilled workforce it needs. With degree-granting status GPRC will be able to quickly respond to the education needs of the community.

How does it benefit students?

Accessibility is the key benefit for students. We know the closer a student is to a university the more likely they are to get a

degree. In fact students more than 80 kilometres from a university are 58 per cent less likely to get a degree than students living within 40 kilometres of a university. Grande Prairie is 458 kilometres from Edmonton. In Alberta, no other city the size of Grande Prairie is that far from a university. GPRC also serves a vast region to the north and into the Northwest Territories. That means many students who would have achieved a post-secondary degree are missing out because it's simply not as accessible as it should be.

What will the community gain if GPRC becomes a Polytechnic University?

There is currently an education gap in Northwestern Alberta due in part to the lack of local access to post-secondary education. For example, in the City of Grande Prairie nine per cent of people have a university degree compared to the provincial average of 14.5 per cent. We also have a lot fewer high school students who attend post-secondary education after graduation. Again, looking at just the City of Grande Prairie 18 per cent of high school grads to go college in comparison to 33 per cent in Calgary, 32 in Edmonton and 28 in Lethbridge. If GPRC has the ability to offer a wider range of degrees that are responsive to the community's needs the entire region will benefit from a more highly-skilled and educated workforce. This will drive the economy and improve the lives of all Albertans.

Can't students already get degrees at GPRC? Why is a Polytechnic University any different?

Yes, GPRC offers degrees through collaborative partnerships with other universities. It does work well but is not without challenges that directly affect our students. These collaborative programs are, as is appropriate, controlled by the larger universities who own those degrees. Changes to entrance requirements, tuition, course content and graduation requirements can, and do, occur without any input from GPRC. Granting our own degrees as a Polytechnic University means degree programs will be developed and controlled locally so they respond to local student and community needs.

Why isn't GPRC pursuing University status rather than this new Polytechnic University status?

It is essential to our students, community and industry in the region that GPRC continue to be able to offer apprenticeship training, certificates and diplomas, non-credit programing as well as be able to offer its own degrees. University status would mean GPRC would focus only on degrees. Polytechnic University status gives us the best of both worlds, allowing us to grant degrees and continue to do all of the apprenticeship training, certificates and diplomas, and non-credit programming that students and industry in the region rely on.

Does Alberta really need another degreegranting institution? Grande Prairie isn't that far away from Edmonton.

Proximity to a post-secondary institution makes a big difference in the cost of an education for students. If a student can live at home while completing their degree the average cost is \$55,000. That same degree will cost \$84,000 for the student who has to move from home. That's a difference of almost \$30,000 for those students who have to leave their home and a significant financial barrier to education for youth in our region.

Is GPRC really ready to take on granting its own degrees?

Yes we are ready and are already delivering the programs. Most of our collaborative degree programs are taught entirely at GPRC by GPRC instructors. If successful in achieving Polytechnic University status GPRC degrees will be developed and governed by GPRC following the same provincial rules that apply to all degree-granting institutions.

GPRC will not rush into granting its own degrees. We'll start to offer the ones we can and continue to partner with other universities when that makes sense. Every decision we make around granting degrees will be focused on providing the best education to our students and meeting our community's needs.

Q6

Is GPRC the only college in Alberta that wants to become a Polytechnic University?

GPRC and Red Deer College (RDC) are both working with the government to obtain Polytechnic University status.

Each college has unique needs in their communities for degree granting status and we both share the vision that Polytechnic University status would give GPRC and RDC the flexibility needed to respond even better to our student and community needs.

Are there other examples of Polytechnic Universities?

Kwantlen Polytechnic University in British Columbia is likely the most similar to what GPRC proposes. It offers programs such as arts, sciences, health, education, business and engineering. What is really great about a Polytechnic University is that it can create various pathways for students to obtain a degree.

Perhaps they start with a certificate then they use that certificate to complete a diploma. With the diploma they can decide to complete their degree. This creates many more options for students. That is the kind of flexibility and responsiveness GPRC could offer as a Polytechnic University.





Community support for this initiative turned a once dark hallway into a lively light-filled space where students gather to study and build those college relationships that last a lifetime.

The new RBC Centre for Student Wellbeing was launched in March. RBC's five-year, \$250,000 commitment is increasing access to Mental Health and Wellness for students with initiatives such as

Everyone arrives at college with their own story, their goals and their fears, says Ribar. She saw how Education Ambassadors have the ability to link students to one another to share stories, achieve their goals and gain confidence.

"Everyone has a starting place and a point when they were nervous," says Ribar. "When you reach out and connect it's rewarding. You see the confidence and smiles on people's faces grow."

As an Education Ambassador Ribar took new students on campus tours during fall and winter orientations. What stood out for her was how quiet and nervous a lot of students are during their first days at college.

"Once you get them to open up and you offer a friendly smile and share your own experiences, they realise that they are not the only ones who feel like that," she says. "I offer them the comfort and openness that is at GPRC so they have the confidence to seek out faculty and other students to build a support system so they can achieve their goals. If they can feel the spirit that is here on campus then I've succeeded."

As part of Stress Less week before exams in December Ribar was involved in organizing a college colouring contest. It was one of the fun events to give students a break from studying and worrying over exams.

"Being around people and organizing events is very rewarding and it doesn't take much," she says. "You get a sense of achievement when you can pass on a smile and create less stress for a fellow student."

Ribar is also taking that college spirit and energy off campus.

Ribar's Education Ambassador experience gave her the confidence to get more involved in the community. She's started volunteering at the Centre for Creative Arts manning a children's activity booth during its 20th Anniversary in January. She also initiated a campus-wide event to collect socks, mitts and toques for Rotary House to help Grande Prairie's homeless population.

"I find it's a stress reliever every time I can give to someone else," she says. "We are a large student body so if you can get students to work together as a team it can go a long way."

The Education Ambassador program offers opportunities to build relationships, work with an amazing group of people and achieve your goals and remove the tunnel vision one can get when just going to class and doing homework, says Ribar.

"There are a lot of opportunities you can participate in that will build connections with other people," she says. "It's important to make memories here and get a good start."
