**CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:** An introductory level studio course designed to give you a foundation in drawing primarily through the use of monochromatic media. Emphasis will be placed on the principles and techniques of drawing while simultaneously exploring expressive uses of the medium. You may work from the still life, figure, and landscape situations, as well as experiment with a broad range of drawing media.
