Calendar Description:

Painting 3130 is a full year introductory level studio course that will increase knowledge of the basic techniques of painting, color theory and perception. Various approaches and conceptual attitudes will be examined to broaden the student's appreciation of painting. Pre - requisites are AR1370 and AR2430

Course Content:

Students upon completion of this course will:

- 1. Exhibit a working knowledge of the fundamentals of painting including: the various characteristics of acrylic paint, methods of applying paint, both traditional and experimental, the preparation of a variety of painting supports
- 2. Identify and apply fundamental principles of composition as related to painting (harmony, balance, rhythm, repetition, dominance, variety) using the elements of visual art (line, shape, value, texture and color)
- 3. Understand perspective, using the principles of depth perception to record the illusion of three dimensions: overlapping, advancing and receding color, atmospheric perspective, diminishing size and detail, tonal modeling.
- 4. Perceive visual relationships in the environment and record these perceptions in terms of paint on canvas.
- 5. Develop an appropriate vocabulary through the discussion/critique process of the above topics.

Evaluation: Criteria For Evaluation

- 1. The level of creativity and craftsmanship demonstrated.
- 2. The degree of knowledge and understanding of the elements and principles of this particular studio discipline.
- 3. Assignment presentations will be required throughout the duration of this course.
- 4. Participation grade is established by your level of enthusiasm, commitment, involvement and flexibility in both studio and individual/collective critiques.

Assessment and Grading:

Assignments 80% Specific assignments are weighted, this grade also / Process Mark includes any day to day activities, this process

is an averaged grade

All assignments will be based on a combination of in class and home assignments.
