COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Painting 3130 is a continuation of the introductory level studio course that will increase knowledge of the basic techniques of painting, color theory and perception. Various approaches and conceptual attitudes will be examined to broaden the student's appreciation of painting.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Students upon completion of this course will:

1. Exhibit an increased knowledge of the fundamentals of easel painting including:
 - The various characteristics of acrylic paint
 - Various methods of applying paint, both traditional and experimental
 - The preparation of a variety of painting supports
 - Paint and collage
2. Increase ability to identify and apply fundamental principles of composition as related to painting (harmony, balance, rhythm, repetition, dominance, variety) using the elements of visual art (line, shape, value, texture and color)

3. Perspective, using the principles of depth perception to record the illusion of three dimensions using: overlapping, advancing and receding color, mechanical perspective, atmospheric perspective, diminishing size and detail, tonal modeling.
4. Perceive visual relationships in the environment and record these perceptions in terms of paint on canvas.
5. Develop increased confidence and competence in the verbal discussion of these topics.

COURSE ACTIVITIES:

Studio based activities in addition to home assignments to be determined by the instructor. Fieldwork may require visits to museums and galleries. Students will be expected to invest a minimum of eight hours a week out of class.

CRITERIA FOR EVALUATION

1. The level of creativity and craftsmanship demonstrated.
2. The degree of knowledge and understanding of the elements and principles of this particular studio discipline.
3. Portfolio presentations will be required throughout the duration of this course.
4. Participation grade is established by your level of enthusiasm, commitment, involvement and flexibility in both studio and individual/collective critiques.

ASSESSMENT AND GRADING:

Mid -Term:

A number grade based upon assessment of all assigned projects up to mid term. Mid term is only an indicator grade for the student's reference on his/her performance in this course.

Final Grade:

90% Class and Home Assignments

10% Participation

Overdue assignments will be penalized. Work must be completed within 10 days of original deadline or failure to do so may constitute a "0" grade.

STUDIO PROCEDURES

Many students will be using the studio, so it is important to maintain care in setting up and cleaning of the space you use, and to exhibit consideration towards workspace, materials and other students.
