
#### **CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:**



#### **COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

- 1. Identify the safety- related licensing requirements for child care centres and nursery schools in Alberta.
- 2. Evaluate indoor and outdoor play spaces and equipment to ensure children's safety.
- 3. Apply injury prevention principles in a variety of settings.
- 4. Identify conditions which may affect children's health including genetic factors, environmental factors, chronic illnesses and allergies.
- 5. Identify licensing requirements related to health issues in programs for young children.
- 6. Assess children's health using appropriate health records, screening procedures and community resources.
- 7. Identify signs and symptoms of communicable diseases.
- 8. Describe measures which caregivers can use to reduce the incidence/spread of communicable diseases.
- 9. Formulate health policies for early childhood programs.
- 10. Demonstrate a variety of methods which will assist children in developing good health practices.
- 11. Demonstrate an understanding of Canada's Food Guide.
- 12. Plan meals and snacks which meet the nutritional requirements of young children and which also reflect cultural and ethnic diversity.
- 13. Describe diet related health problems and plan meals and snacks for children on restricted diets.
- 14. Describe strategies caregivers can use to promote healthy eating habits.
- 15. Describe the correct procedures for storing, handling, preparing and serving food.
- 16. Select, plan and implement developmentally appropriate nutrition experiences for young children.

#### **LEARNING OUTCOMES:**

- 1. Assess general safety issues in the indoor and outdoor early childhood setting.
- 2. Explain practices that provide safe environments and prevent injury in early learning and child care programs.
- 3. Implement policies and practices to ensure children's well-being.
- 4. Describe measures which caregivers can use to reduce the incidence/spread of communicable diseases.
- 5. Describe appropriate practices to promote nutritional and dental health.
- 6. Plan and implement developmentally appropriate health, safety and nutrition experiences for children to promote wellness.
