CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: A practical course which explores children's art, literature and music from a child-centered perspective.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

This course intends to provide students with:

•Practical hands on exploration of art, literature and music from a childcentered perspective in order to support students' ability to create experiences for young children in those areas.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon completion of the course learners will effectively:

- •Be able to discuss the concept of creativity
- •Express knowledge of the environmental conditions that affect the development of creativity in young children
- •Explain how art, literature and music contribute to a child's physical and social-emotional development
- •Demonstrate use of a developmentally appropriate, child-centered, play based approach to program planning for art, literature and music

"Flight: Alberta's Early Learning and Care Framework", is a leading curriculum for the early learning and child care profession. Concepts from the framework will be covered in a variety of different ways in each of our Early Learning and Childcare courses.

EVALUATIONS:

This course involves a significant amount of experiential hands-on work. Students must be physically present and actively participating during class time in order to receive the 40% in class experience mark.

All assignments involve planning and implementing hands on experiences for young children between the ages of 18 months –5 years. In order to successfully complete CD1050, students must be able to access groups of children in a licensed childcare facility. Your CD 1045 practicum will provide you with this access to children. If you are not registered in CD 1045 please make an alternative arrangement with your instructor to complete your assignments.

Students already working in suitable childcare environment may implement their assignments in their workplace.
