CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: A practical course which examines the characteristics of quality programs for infants and toddlers and explores programming techniques which respond to individual, and group needs of children up to 36 months of age. The focus of this course is on developing an awareness of the critical importance of care and interaction in the lives of infants and toddlers.

DELIVERY MODE(S): Classroom instruction will include a combination of lectures, discussions, small and large group work based on both text and additional readings. Audio-visual materials and other resources will also be used. There will be both in and out of class activities and assignments.

- The criteria of quality programs for infants and toddler
- The developmental abilities of infants and toddlers

- Ways in which to support individual and group needs of infant and toddlers
- The critical importance of care and interaction in the lives of infants and toddlers.

- Describe the characteristics of high-quality infant and child care settings.
- Describe the developmental physical, social, emotional, cognitive and play abilities of infants and toddlers.
- Select and provide materials and experiences that support and enhance all aspects of infants' and toddlers' development.
- Describe appropriate care giving practices including styles of interacting and methods of guiding behavior.
- Assist parents in their role.
