<u>Course Description</u>: An introduction to the process of acting and to dramatic form, this course is based on explorations of movement, vocal development, scene creation, and ensemble acting through improvisation acting techniques. Students will learn disciplines of physical relaxation, breathing, physical integration, responsivity, and the employment of creative impulse, within themselves and between each other in small group scene creation. Dramatic process is a collaborative process and requires respect, trust, and care for oneself and one's co-creators.

<u>Course Content</u>: The course flows between individual preparation, group preparation, and group creation, practice, and presentation. Activities will include acting/improv. exercises, ensemble exercises, creating, rehearsing, and presenting scenes within class. There are possibilities for presenting work outside of class on campus and off campus and for a final class presentation of scenes for invited guests. Students will keep journals of their process and will be required to attend at least two live theatre performances (outside of class time) for which they will write a short response paper. Students need to commit to rehearsal time and coaching time outside of class, especially in preparation for their scenes.

<u>Evaluation</u>: Evaluation is based on class participation (30%), presentation of scenes (30%), journal (20%), and 2 response papers (20%). Journals will be handed in at midterm and at the end of term. There will be a student teacher consultation at mid-term and end of term to discuss the student's progress and the instructor is always available for student-initiated consultation.

<u>Required Materials</u>: Students need to have comfortable, flexible clothing (no zippers, or belts) that they use for class. No jewelry is to be worn during class.

Additional Costs: Theatre performance admission is the student's responsibility.

<u>Attendance</u>: More than 10% absenteeism (a max. of 2 absences) may constitute a failure except for medical or extenuating circumstances in which case a doctor's letter will be required. Students are expected to be on time and prepared for class.

STUDENTS MUST BE PREPARED TO SPEND TIME OUTSIDE OF CLASS TO REHEARSE WITH THEIR SCENE PARTNERS, FOR MIDTERM AND END OF TERM INTERVIEWS, AND FOR SCENE COACHING SESSIONS FOR THEIR 2^{ND} AND 3^{RD} SCENES.

Class Calendar:

Each class will begin with a circle check-in. Then we will spend at least 3/4 hour doing our physical preparation/warm-up (more time in the first classes where we are learning techniques). Then we will go into the work that is the focus of each class. The class will end with a circle check-out.

While general foci are set now, we will adjust over the term to attend to what is most important for the learning of the class.

Students must arrive on time and ready to work – already changed into workout clothes. Bring food for the break – usually after the warm-up.
