CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

The theory of consumer behavior, theory of production and cost, price and output determination under competition, monopoly and other market structures are presented.

DELIVERY MODE(S):

On-campus (face-to-face) – This type of course will be delivered on campus in a specific location which will be indicated on the student timetable. Students are expected to fully attend in person.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

In this course, we will revisit several microeconomic topics that have been introduced in introductory microeconomics but in a greater depth. This course introduces students to the intermediate concepts and techniques of microeconomic analysis. Attention will be paid to the theory of supply and demand; theory of consumer behavior; theory of production and cost; welfare analysis; price and output determination under different market structures.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

At the end of the course, students are expected to be able to apply microeconomic tools to the analysis of economic issues such as welfare program, governmental subsidies and taxes in a greater depth. In addition, students should be able to use economic models (including supply and demand, models of the behavior of competitive and monopolistic firms, consumer optimization models) to analyze economic behavior and social issues.
