## DELIVERY MODE: Lecture / Class Participation and Discussion / Blackboard

PRE-REQUISITES: EN 30 / 1030 or a passing grade in an equivalent course (Completion of the senior High School English requirement is mandatory.)

## CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

An introduction to the discipline of English and to the ways in which those in that discipline think about and analyze literary and everyday language practices. Instruction in basic essay writing skills will also be included.

## EXTENDED COURSE DESCRIPTION.

English 1111 combines an introduction to the various prose genres of English literature-short stories, novels, literary essays, and non-fiction -- with formal instruction in writing skills. A considerable part of the course is devoted to composition. The writing assignments are mainly discursive and analytical papers on, British, Canadian, American, European, and postcolonial world literature. This course emphasizes critical reading, literary analysis, and effective essay writing. Classes will generally consist of short lectures, discussions, group exercises, and individual writing practice. As a result, students should increase their appreciation of literature and improve their ability to communicate ideas effectively.

Panel or Blackboard Discussions on assigned authors or literary works.*

- Three panel discussions will be scheduled during the Winter Term 2009.
- Nearly half the class-roughly 16 students, or a maximum of 5-6 per panel-may opt to take part in a panel discussion.
- Other students in my three EN 1111 sections will be assigned to a webbased Blackboard Discussion group on three selected prose authors/literary works.
- This large group will consist of about 45-50 students from three different sections.
*The deadline for all students to post comments to Blackboard Discussion forums will be the next calendar day after the last panel discussion on the same author[s] or respective work[s] has taken place. By 5 p.m. on the relevant due dates, Blackboard forums will be closed; students with no postings (or few substantive contributions) will forfeit marks.
- First Panel Discussion on Short Stories: Tentative Dates = Thurs., Oct. 8 (B2 \& F2/TC) and Fri., Oct. 9 (A2).
- For all sections, the $1^{\text {st }}$ Blackboard Discussion on Short Stories must be completed by $5 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. on Sat., Oct. 10 -or by $5 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. on the next calendar day following the first in-class panel discussion.
- Second Panel Discussion on Further Short Stories and Literary Essays: Tentative Dates = Mon., Oct. 26 (B2 \&F2/TC) and Tues., Oct. 27 (A2).

- For all sections, the $3^{\text {rd }}$ Blackboard Discussion on Bridget Jones's Diary must be completed by 5 p.m. on Sat., Nov. 28-or by 5 p.m. on the next calendar day following the third in-class panel discussion.
