CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: This course involves studies in literatures in English from around the world. Instruction will include essay writing skills.

DELIVERY MODE(S): The course work includes lecture, class discussion, in-class quizzes, and written assignments.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: This course offers a survey of twentieth- and twenty-first century writings from around the world. Its aim is not to discuss contemporary global literatures in their totality; instead,

this course is designed to allow us to perceive the richness and variety of international writing. At the same time, we will learn how literature makes connections across geographical, cultural, and historical distances.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: After taking this course, the successfully participating students will demonstrate the following:

- The ability to use a critical vocabulary suited to the discussion of literary texts
- The ability to associate authors and texts with relevant literary moments, periods, and geographic regions
- Skills crucial to effective university-level essay composition, from planning, to writing, to revision
- The ability to perform secondary research as well as the ability to use research effectively and responsibly in writing assignments

COURSE SCHEDULE/TENTATIVE TIMELINE:

Week 1:	Introduction to the course

Weeks 6-10:	Mid-century writing: history, memory, postcolonialism
Weeks 11-15:	The late 20 th century and beyond: postmodernism, diaspora, globalization

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

Anyone who wants to meet with me outside of my scheduled hours may contact me to arrange an alternate meeting time.
