CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: At an intermediate level, this course emphasizes the principles and practices of writing fiction. Students are encouraged to explore established and emerging forms, and to focus on the production of a completed work of fiction.

PREREQUISITE/COREQUISITE: EN2950. Students without EN2950 must have 6 credits of junior English and the permission of the instructor to register.

All other readings posted to MyClass. Students are responsible for ensuring that they can access the posted files.

DELIVERY MODE: Lecture/workshop

COURSE OBJECTIVES: This course is intended to guide students in the completion of one or more short stories. The class discussion of drafts is intended not only to give students a sense of their audience as writers, but also to develop a sense of context for their writing. This class is intended for students who have already established their writing foundations in EN 2950, and who are prepared to explore short fiction structurally and in terms of the shifting content expectations of contemporary audiences.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: By the end of this course, students will be able to

- Identify creative writing techniques in works of published short fiction
- Write and edit a complete short story
- Present a work in progress for group feedback
- Offer feedback in a detailed and constructive manner
- Integrate a range of feedback in revising their work for submission

These are intended to keep students writing new work and thinking about the writing process. Students must submit at least six weekly assignments to receive full credit.
 - O Assignments must be submitted to the MyClass dropbox for that assignment. Assignments must be in pdf format. Improperly submitted work will not be accepted. If the dropbox for some reason will not give you access, e-mail your completed assignment to the instructor to prove that you have completed it, then submit on Brightspace when the issue has been resolved.
 - Late submissions of weekly assignments will not be accepted.
