WINTER 2021 DELIVERY:

Mixed Delivery – Remote and Onsite. This course is delivered remotely with some face-to-face/onsite components at the GPRC [*Grande Prairie*] campus.

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: Introduction to the origin and evolution of the Earth and the solar system, and plate tectonics and the rock cycle. Simple energy balances and interactions between radiation and the atmosphere, oceans, ice masses, and the global hydrological cycle. Evolution of life, biogeography, and global climate in the context of geological time. The carbon cycle. Human interaction with the Earth. Mineral and energy resources.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: The objective of this course is to introduce students to the basic concepts of Earth System Science and provide an understanding and appreciation of the Earth and interacting components.

- Developed an understanding and appreciation of the basic characteristics, history and processes of Planet Earth, and
- Gained an insight into how different components of Earth system interact and affect life on the Planet
