FR0120 (B2): Beginner French I Grade 11 Equivalent - 5 (5-0-0) HS/UT 75 Hours for 15 weeks

#### CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

This is the entry-level course for students who have chosen French. Basic conversational vocabulary will be covered, as well as verbal structures including past tense. You will develop aural/oral skills through drills, directed dialogue and music.

\*\*Please note: FR0120 and FR0130 together are equivalent to the French 10, 20, and 30 programs in high school. The course moves at a rapid pace because it covers approximately the same content contained in the three-course high school program. Nevertheless, FR0120 is a beginner's course and no prior knowledge of French is required or expected.

## PREREQUISITE(S)/COREQUISITE: NONE

\*\* Please note: Students who already have French 30 ought to register in FR2110/FR2120 and those with FLA 30 ought to register in FR 2210/FR2240.

## REQUIRED TEXT/RESOURCE MATERIALS:

- 1. Mitchell, Mitschke, Tano, Promenades, 4th Edition (Textbook with Supersite), Vista Higher Learning.
- 2. Recommended: a good French/English dictionary or online dictionary: WordReference.com.

### **DELIVERY MODE(S):**

The delivery mode will consist of lectures explaining grammatical concepts, vocabulary, and cultural elements as well as group and individual oral, written, and reading exercises reinforcing these concepts. In preparation for exams, most of class time will focus on the essential Contextes, Structures, Vocabulaire,

and Expressions utiles of Promenades (Chapters 1-5). As time permits, students will also be introduced to the Roman-photo, Lecture culturelle, Synthèse, Écriture and Savoir-Faire sections, work on practice quizzes, and become capable of working independently both inside and outside of class. In addition, a combined Workbook/Lab manual with online reference is to be completed by students and provides opportunity for repetition and self-correction. The course moves at a rapid pace as it covers approximately the same content contained in the three-course high school program.

## **COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

In FR0120, the primary objective is to develop skills in all four language areas - listening, speaking, reading, and writing. You will learn basic vocabulary, grammar, common expressions for conversation, and simple sentence structures, including how to ask questions and how to answer them - in the present and the future.

#### **LEARNING OUTCOMES:**

At the end of the semester, the student who completes this course will be able to:

- read and understand short sentences, conversations, and texts;
- write simple sentences and paragraphs using basic grammatical structures and verb tenses (present, and near future) to ask and answer questions or express themselves at a fundamental level;
- understand simple expressions, questions, and conversations in French;
- speak and interact using basic grammatical structures, vocabulary, and verb tenses to express themselves on common topics;
- understand common cultural expressions and appreciate the French culture in a diverse Frenchspeaking world.

#### Notes:

- 1) FR0120 may transfer for 3 university credits only if credit has not been received for French 20. At the **University of Calgary** and **MacEwan University**, FR0120 is worth 3 credits but only if it is combined with FR0130 (3 credits).
- 2) FR0120 is worth 5 credits and consists of five hours of instructional time each week.

#### 5. Final Exam

A final comprehensive written exam consisting of written, listening/comprehension parts will be scheduled by the Registrar. The Oral Exam will take place with a partner during the last week of classes.
