- Students will be able to recall a timeline of major events in Canadian history since 1867, identify and explain the causal factors and other significant details for each, and use this information to participate in class discussions and answer questions on tests and examinations.
- Students will be able to employ their recollection of Canadian history to compare and predict reactions to more recent historical and current events.
- Students will be able to analyze historical work and recognize issues within it.
- Students will be able to formulate appropriate research questions; identify, select, and investigate appropriate primary and secondary sources; interpret the resulting information; and present their research findings in an appropriate format.
