Topics in the History of Canadian External Relations

Instructor: Dr. J. Petryshyn

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In general, this course examines Canada's diplomatic, political and cultural inter – relationship with its two great mentors – Great Britain and the United States. More specifically, discussions will focus on the development of Canadian foreign policy (from Laurier to Chretien) with a particular emphasis on Canada's "middle power" role in global affairs during the Cold War period. The format is a weekly lecture/seminar session.
