CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

NS1240 Foundations of Nursing 1

 \star 3 (fi 6) (first term, 3-0-0). The course explores the meanings of health and healing. It highlights the diversity of beliefs, values, and perceptions of health. The course introduces the Canadian Health Care System, conceptual frameworks of health promotion, determinants of health, disease and injury prevention, and primary health care. The focus is on the nurse/client relationship in a relational practice context.

It is expected that ALL assignments must be completed to obtain credit in the course.

Assignments are expected to be passed in at the time and place they are due. Extensions <u>may</u> be granted and must be negotiated with the instructor prior to the due date and with a date specified for late submissions. Consent should be in writing.

A penalty of one letter grade for each calendar day that an assignment is submitted after the due date will be deducted from the final mark. For example, a paper marked at B+ would receive and adjusted grade of B if handed in one day late. When submitting **electronically**, it is the **student's** responsibility to ensure the assignment has been received.

ASSIGNMENT DESCRIPTIONS:

1) Forum Postings / Participation : Due Fridays in the Discussion Forum by 1600 hrs. The forum postings provide students with opportunities to develop reflection skills, critical thinking and application of nursing knowledge skills.

Each week there will be an "in reflection" question posted to the forum. Students will post a response to the question related to the weekly concept in the discussion forum. Full marks will be given for excellent quality responses to all forum questions. Posts will demonstrate critical thinking and insightful application of nursing knowledge.

2) Scholarly Paper: Due date: March 23rd

Students will write a scholarly paper discussing health considerations and health promotion strategies that a nurse could implement for the Clarence and Jenny exemplar found on myClass. The student will choose 2 concepts found on the concept list for NS1240 and will apply each to the Clarence and Jenny exemplar found on myClass.

- A. Writing Process:
 - a. Students will identify two concepts from the concept list in NS1240 they wish to apply to the Clarence and Jenny exemplar.
 - b. Using peer reviewed articles students will write a four-page paper discussing health considerations / health promotion strategies related to older adults in relation to each of the two chosen concepts. The paper will include how the nurse could promote health for Clarence and Jenny in relation to the two chosen concepts. The title page and reference page are not included in the page limit. Peer reviewed articles should be within the last five years.
- B. Writing requirements:
 - APA 7th edition throughout the document
 - Title Page: Note: Please use your name.
 - Abstract and Author's note: None required for this assignment
 - Introduction
 - Background related to the topic to provide a context for the reader
 - Statement of aim/purpose of paper and how paper will unfold
 - Thesis statement
 - Body of Paper
 - The main body of your paper should include discussion related to the concepts you have chosen. General statements are supported with specific details **from scholarly sources** that further your point. Paragraphs are crafted to support and **extend your own ideas**.
 - Use professional literature to explore and support your ideas.

• Conclusion

- Bring together what you have discussed as it relates to your thesis statement.
- o Summarize key points and provide a concluding statement
- References
 - Complete list of references for each source cited in your paper in APA style.

3) Midterm Exam: February 23rd

Multiple choice exam assessing concepts in the first six weeks of the course. The midterm exam will be completed within a scheduled class time.

4) Final Exam: During Final Exam Week – TBA

Multiple choice exam assessing concepts from the entire course. Date, time, and location of the final examination is scheduled by the Office of the Registrar in accordance with Grande Prairie Regional College Calendar and will be available on MyGPRC.

Exams are supervised on Zoom and may utilize Lock Down Browser and/or Respondus to protect the integrity of the exam.

Deferred final examinations may be granted when an examination has been missed or interrupted because of illness, or a conflict with religious beliefs.
