CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

The primary focus is the application of theory in the client centered care of hospitalized adults and elderly clients and their families experiencing variations in health (acute and chronic illnesses). Practice occurs primarily in primary, secondary, and tertiary acute care settings.

REQUIRED TEXT/RESOURCE MATERIALS:

All previously required textbooks and resources from years one and two.

DELIVERY MODE(S):

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- 9. Demonstrate with minimal assistance the ability to integrate selected nursing model/theory in client centered nursing practice.

- 11. Demonstrate with guidance the processes of self-directed learning, critical thinking, and group process in inquiry based learning, in a variety of acute care settings.

NS3080 is comprised of clinical days and pre/post conferences. Attendance is required for all components of the course. In order to pass NS 3080, students must demonstrate safe ethical nursing practice, professional behaviour, and complete the following experiences:

- 1. During this course, students will have a continuous experience in an institutional setting that includes nursing practice with adults or children experiencing chronic or less acute variances in health.
- 2. Where the clinical setting allows, students will co-ordinate care for 1-2 clients. Alternately, bearing in mind the characteristics of specific placement settings such as client acuity level, students will then co-ordinate care for 2 clients. The emphasis should be on learning depth and breadth and client safety.
- 3. Participate in labs and simulation exercises.
- 4. Participate in a follow-through experience with a client having a medical or surgical procedure in the clinical setting.
- 5. Use a nursing model to perform a client assessment appropriate to the clinical setting and complete a care plan.
- 6. Participate in client education.
- 7. Collaborate with clients, family, nurses and members of other disciplines

LATE ASSIGNMENT POLICY:

All assignments are to be submitted in at the time and place they are due. Extensions on assignments <u>may</u> be granted and <u>must</u> be negotiated with the instructor **prior** to the due date and with a date specified for late submissions. A penalty of a letter grade for each working day that an assignment is submitted after the due date will be deducted from the final grade. For example, a paper scored at B+ would receive an adjusted grade of B if handed in one day late.

PROGRESSION IN A CLINCAL COURSE:

IMMUNIZATIONS, CPR AND WHMIS CERTIFICATION:

You are responsible for ensuring that all immunization, CPR-HCP and WHIMIS requirements are met and remain current throughout your nursing program. Students who do not comply with these policies may be barred from taking clinical courses. Please see the Student Handbook which has been posted on Brightspace related to policies regarding immunizations, CPR-HCP and WHMIS certification.

Lost Photo ID cards should be promptly reported to the Nursing Office (H206). There will be a cost to replace lost cards.

CLINICAL PREPARDNESS:

It is expected that you will prepare for each clinical day by researching procedures, medical conditions, medications, etc. Required psychomotor skills should be reviewed prior to the clinical experience. Students should be prepared to discuss their client plan of care (including the client priority needs, nursing diagnoses, medication profiles, and any client teachings) with the instructor during clinical time.

If a student is **not adequately prepared for clinical**, the instructor may request the student leave the clinical agency. This would be a decision made after considering client safety.

PROFESSIONAL DRESS:

Patient Research: You will be required to come into the clinical setting prior to your scheduled shifts to collect confidential patient information to prepare for your clinical shifts. You will be required to wear your nametag and come dressed professional casual. That means absolutely no jeans, leggings/lululemon pants or sweats. You are to wear your GPRC nametag at all times.

Clinical Shifts: You will attend all clinical shifts dressed in your GPRC approved uniforms (these can be purchased at the bookstore) and will be prepared for clinical with all necessary supplies. Uniform scrub jackets and cardigans are acceptable when needed. A locker will be available at the hospital for your belongings.

For safety reasons, the only jewellery that is acceptable is one pair of small stud earrings, a serviceable watch, and a plain wedding band. You will be required to remove obvious body piercing jewellery for safety reasons. Hair should be neat and off the face, with shoulder length or longer hair tied back. No nail polish. Makeup should be minimal and no perfume. The use of perfumed lotions, deodorants and powders is discouraged. Shoes are white and soft soled with an enclosed foot, heel and toe.

Good personal hygiene and grooming are part of a nurse's professional decorum. The faculty reserve the right to suggest the appropriateness of student appearance in the clinical setting.

Students are to wear their GPRC Photo ID that will serve as the official means of identification in all clinical areas. Photo ID cards will be available to students during Orientation week. All students are required to wear Photo ID in the clinical setting, whether this occurs in an agency or in a community/home environment, including the time used at the clinical setting for patient research.
