COURSE OBJECTIVES:

EVALUATIONS:

- Nursing practice is evaluated using the Evaluation of Nursing Practice (ENP) tool. ENP - 70%
 - To encourage the development of self-reflective practice, relevant clinical experiences, reflection on practice, nursing care, and learning goals will be evaluated through discussion in in weekly seminars and post-conference.
 - Significant learning experiences that challenge or confirm student assumptions, values, and beliefs related to mental health will occur in two (2) reflective journals that will be incorporated into the ENP.
 - Evaluation of student's clinical performance:
 - A formative and written summative Evaluation of Nursing Practice will be completed by the student and the instructor at the end of the course (see Course Syllabus for more information).
 - A midterm evaluation will be done as well.

Evaluation will be accomplished through observation (direct or indirect) assessment and evaluation of the student during nursing practice. Evaluations will be written by the instructor and may be supplemented with input from peers, field guides, the staff of an agency, and/or the client.

- 2. Clinical Scholarly Assignment 30%
- 3. Safe Medicate Pass/Fail
 - Year 3 students will be tested on:
 - Essential Skills 2018 (adults and pediatrics)
 - o Advanced skills: pediatric body-weight based calculations
 - o Advanced skills: intermittent infusions
 - Advanced skills: continuous infusions
 - a. If a student does not achieve 90% in any of the tested modules, they will re-write the test for that module.
 - b. Students will have 3 opportunities to achieve 90% in all medication math calculation exams.
 - c. If a student is not able to achieve 90% after the third attempt, they will not be able to attend the clinical course and may be asked to withdraw from the program after review by Student Academic Review Committee (SARC).
 - d. If a student returns to the nursing program after a program interruption, and a different medication calculation program has been instituted, the student will be responsible for purchasing the new program and writing the medication math calculation exam that is being currently used.

The Chief Medical Officer of Health Order 05-2020 (<u>https://open.alberta.ca/publications/cmoh-order-05-2020-2020-covid-19-response</u>) states the situations where Albertans are **legally** obligated to quarantine or isolate:

• Albertans are legally required to be in **quarantine for 14 days** either:

- Immediately upon return from travel outside of Canada, or
- If they are a close contact of a person who tested positive for COVID-19.
- Albertans are **legally** required to be in **isolation for 10 days, or until symptoms resolve, whichever takes longer**, if they:
 - Are diagnosed with COVID-19.
 - Develop a new or worsening cough, fever, shortness of breath/difficulty breathing, chills, fatigue or weakness, new loss of smell or taste, gastrointestinal symptoms (abdominal pain, diarrhea, vomiting), or sore throat not related to a pre-existing illness or health condition.
- Order 05-2020 includes the following restrictions and requirements for isolation:
 - Remaining at home, and 2 metres distant from others at all times.
 - Not attending work, school, social events, or any other public gatherings.
 - Not taking public transportation.
