CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: Introductory Cree I is a general introduction to Plains Cree (Y dialect) grammar, and vocabulary with an emphasis in the practice in speaking and working in the language laboratory.

- Introduce students to simple sentences in Roman Orthography and Cree Syllabics
- Have students present projects both in writing and presented orally in class
- Provide preparation for the intermediate Cree NT1522.

- Students will be able to recognize words written in Roman Orthography.
- Students will be able to demonstrate and comprehend simple sentences written in Roman Orthography, through their knowledge of vocabulary, word agreement, word order and association.
- Students will also be able to interpret and write in Cree Syllabics.
- Students will be able to identify and incorporate Cree words into simple sentences by translating them into English.
- Students will be able to demonstrate a basic level understanding of the Cree language.

There will be in class and some take-home assignments throughout this term. Often the structure is provided for you through class lectures.

Attendance and participation are very important in this course. Students will not be allowed to reschedule missed quizzes or assignments unless they provide a valid reason.

Important Note on Assignments: Deadlines for assignments will be strictly observed. All assignments are due at the beginning of class on the date they are due. LATE assignments are penalized 5% PER DAY that they are late to a maximum of five days (25%); after five days, late assignments will not be accepted. Only in extremely special cases will extensions be granted. The instructor will not be responsible for any assignment handed in to anyone other than the instructor. It is expected that all assignments will be typed (except for in-class exams). Assignments are not handed back until all assignments are in. The final paper will be handed back at the last class or at the final exam. Student assignments remaining with the instructor 90 days after the semester ends will be shredded.

Projects: Students will complete two projects:

- 1. A short story or book written in Roman Orthography or Cree Syllabics, which must be presented in class:
- 2. a) essay on topic of interest in language or culture;
 - b) oral presentation on any structural aspect of the language or culture.

Language Laboratory: Language lab tapes are available for student use. Attendance is critical and is included as a portion of your lab grade.

Guest Speakers: Upon availability and time permitting.

Quizzes: Attendance is imperative as quizzes are given a high percentage in final grading of the course.
