Calendar Description

The course explores the study of play, physical education, recreation, sport and leisure as institutionalized ways in which society organizes and teaches attitudes and skills. It provides an introduction to the importance of sociocultural inquiry and the notion of being critical as an empowering process.

- To introduce students to the social analysis of play, leisure, and sport.
- To explore the influence of social indicators like class, race, ethnicity, disability, gender, sexuality, and age on who can and cannot enjoy sport and leisure activities.
- To introduce students to the notion of critical thinking as an empowering process.
- To prepare students for more advanced courses in the history and sociology of sport and leisure.
