## **CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:**

Biological, cognitive and social aspects of psychological development will be explored, with special emphasis on infancy, childhood and adolescence.

## **COURSE OBJECTIVES:** As a result of taking this course, students will be taught;

- major theories, perspectives and concepts in the field of developmental psychology
- various developmental research methods
- nature-nurture debate with regard to various developmental changes
- physical development during the prenatal stage of development
- physical, cognitive, emotional, social/personality development during early childhood, adolescence, and adulthood
- death and dying

### **LEARNING OUTCOMES**

- In this course, students will demonstrate fundamental knowledge and comprehension of major concepts, theoretical perspectives and empirical findings in the topical areas of developmental psychology
- discuss how principles discussed in these areas enable the understanding of development,
   both change and stability
- incorporate sociocultural factors in their explanations of developmental change and stability
- demonstrate basic level understanding of various research methods used in scientific investigations of psychological phenomena
- apply their knowledge of basic research methodology to critically evaluate psychological research and write an integrative research paper

Note: This course will focus primarily on development from conception until adolescence

- Quizzes: There will be four multiple choice quizzes. Each quiz is worth 5%, for a course total of 20%. These quizzes will be written online via myClass during class time on the dates posted on page 4 of this outline. You are expected to be connected to Zoom during these quizzes. Please refer to page 6 of this course outline for more information on missed quizzes.
- 2. <u>Midterm and Final Exams:</u> For this term, the midterm and final exams will include multiple-choice questions based on material covered in both the textbook and the lecture **The final exam will NOT be cumulative**; it will cover material from the class immediately after the midterm to the end of term. The midterm is worth 20% and the final exam is worth 30%. Again, these exams will be written online via myClass during class time on the dates posted on page 4 of this outline and you are expected to be connected to Zoom during these quizzes. **Please refer to pages 6 of this outline for more information on missing the midterm** *exam and/or final exam*.
- <u>Participation/Attendance:</u> Participation-Student input during lectures is enthusiastically welcomed and strongly encouraged. There are a variety of ways that students can participate, such as asking relevant questions and/or making insightful comments during the lectures. Additionally, various discussion questions will be posted on myClass. Students are expected to contribute to these discussions by posting new threads and replying to other students' threads. Details regarding these online discussion are provided on the myClass site.

<u>Attendance</u>-Attendance will be taken every class. Attendance may be taken more than once during a class period. Please note that in my courses, students who miss more than 10% of classes without an acceptable excuse may be debarred from writing the final exam.

- <u>4.</u> <u>Chapter Assignments.</u> There will be 12 multiple choice chapter assignments, each comprised of questions taken from the test bank of the textbook. Your marks across all the assignments will be averaged; the average mark of all the assignments is worth 10% of your overall grade. These assignments will be posted on myClass and you will answer the questions on myClass. Deadlines for each assignment is included on this course outline (page 4).
- **5. Annotated Bibliography.** Details of this assignment are provided on a separate document.

### STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

## 2. **ZOOM EXPECTATIONS**

- A camera and microphone are mandatory; the camera must be kept on during the lectures, but the microphone should be on mute except when you wish to speak up (i.e., ask questions or make comments relevant to the lecture/class discussions).
- Your name must be displayed with your image. If you prefer to use a nickname or initials, let me know in advance.
- The chat feature in Zoom is to be limited to questions to the instructor or supportive comments to students-it is NOT a place to have a general text chat.

- Although lectures will be recorded, each recording will be made available ONLY to students who remotely attend the lecture at the scheduled class time (and wish to review the lecture) and to students who have an excused absence for a particular lecture.
- Students are expected to exhibit respectful behavior to the instructor, guest speakers and other students. We will discuss topics in class that may cause disagreement. It is expected that all participants will deal with such disagreements WITHOUT resorting to behaviors/comments that are dismissive, demeaning or threatening to others. Swearing and use of slurs against individuals or groups (racial, religious, gender, etc.) are unacceptable. Students unable to meet these expectations will be required to leave the class in the interest of preserving the learning opportunities of other students. Please refer to the GPRC calendar for more information regarding student conduct.

# 3. ATTEND CLASS (ZOOM LECTURES) AT THE SCHEDULED CLASS TIMES:

This term, all lectures will be delivered remotely at the scheduled class times via Zoom; students are expected to attend lectures at the scheduled class times via Zoom. Attendance will be taken every class and may be taken more than once each class.

<u>Missed Lecture Material</u>: Although notes are available on myClass, they are not complete; attendance is required to get full lecture information. If you miss a class, you are to obtain missed material by approaching a classmate, <u>not</u> the instructor. It would be <u>unfair</u> for students who miss lectures to be advantaged by getting the instructor's notes.

Missed Quizzes/Exams: Dates for the quizzes and midterm are included on page 4 of this course outline. Missed quizzes will generally <u>not</u> be rescheduled. If you miss a quiz due to verified illness, dentistry, accident, emergency, or GPRC obligations (e.g., you are away due to the requirements of another course) the weight of the quiz will be transferred; missed Quiz 1 or 2 will be transferred to the midterm exam, missed Quiz 3 or 4 will be transferred to the final exam. Quizzes missed for reasons that do not include verified illness, dentistry, accident, or emergency, will be assigned a "0" (zero). Holidays, employment, etc. are NOT considered to be excusable reasons to miss any exam in this course. Furthermore, quizzes missed without explanation from the student will assigned a "0".

According to GPRC policy, deferring a missed Midterm Exam is at the discretion of the instructor. In my courses, students who miss a midterm because of illness, dentistry, accident, or emergency (verified) may write the midterm at a later date (set by me—I will choose a date that is mutually convenient for me and the student). When students miss the midterm for reasons that do not include verified illness, dentistry, accident, or emergency, a "0" is assigned to that the midterm. Students who miss the midterm without explanation will receive a "0" on the midterm. Absences from a registrar-scheduled Final Exam fall under GPRC Examination Policy. It is the responsibility of the student to be informed about these policies prior to the final examination period.

If you miss the final exam due to illness, you will be required to submit an application to the Registrar's office for permission to write a deferred exam and must do so within 48 hours of the scheduled exam time. You may defer the final exam for up to 20 days of the end of the examination period. You will be required to provide documentation for your illness.

## 4. LEARN & RECORD ASSIGNMENT DEADLINES AND EXAMINIATION DATES/TIMES

These dates/times are announced in class and/or are included on course materials (e.g., chapter assignments deadlines are page 4 of this course outline). For the sake of fairness for ALL students, assignment deadlines will NOT be extended for those who miss an assignment. If you know that you will be away when an assignment is due, it is expected that you hand in that assignment earlier than the announced/posted date. FYI—myClass chapter assignments can started/completed before the announced/posted deadlines.

## 5. OUT-OF-CLASS WORK

Students are expected to prepare for each lecture by reading the assigned chapters and handouts. Although the instructor feels that all the material in the textbook is important and interesting, limited class time prevents discussion of all the material covered in the assigned chapters. You are responsible for learning the material covered in the assigned chapters, including material that is not discussed in class. Please feel free to approach me outside of class if you wish to get clarification on this material.
