TOPIC B - INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS, 1919 - 1990s

Introduction - concepts of international relations

Causes and course of W.W.II, 1919 - 1945:

Versailles Treaty, League of Nations, collective security, appeasement, military campaigns, Holocaust and Final Solution, War Crimes Tribunal.

Origin of the Cold War between the Superpowers, 1945 - 1963:

relations pre-1945, Yalta Conferences, spheres of influence and Iron Curtain, containment, Communism in Asia and Korean War, Cuban Missile Crisis.

Decolonization and the Emergence of the Third World, 1945 - present:

19th century imperialism, patterns of decolonization -India - gradual evolution, post independence problems Vietnam - cold War perspectives, domino theory, escalation South Africa - internal colonization, dismantling apartheid

Growth of Internationalism, 1945 - present:

aims and structure of United Nations, peace-keeping in the Middle East, evolution of E.C., concept of First/Third and North/South, N.I.E.O., international agreements on the environment, arms control, peace conferences.
