CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: A study of the politics and social ramifications of conformity, deviance, and their relation to social change. The course examines how and why some behaviour patterns are defined as deviant or conformist, and factors that influence this. Many types of behaviour will be discussed.

Chapter Weekly Quizzes

Beginning week 3, you will complete chapter quizzes on our course webpage (myClass). There will be 10 questions (multiple choice), and one bonus quiz. These quizzes serve to encourage you to consistently read the chapters and to test your knowledge as we move forward in the course. Beginning the third week of the class (See below), **quizzes will open on Monday at midnight and close the following Sunday at 11:59 PM**. It is your responsibility to ensure that you complete these quizzes on time. No exceptions will be made for lateness.

Video Assignments (group or solo work)

You will complete two assignments based on two films shown in the semester. These assignments ask you to critically assess the content of the films, apply sociological theories and concepts, and demonstrate your critical thinking skills. You will have one week to complete the assignments after the film has been shown in class. You may work on these assignments in groups or individually. Please note: grades will be shared if working in groups. Instructions for these assignments are available on myClass.

Written Assignment: Deviance Case Study

You will complete a research project based on a case study related to deviance and social control. The topic is up to you, but options will be given upon request. The project will be broken down into the following steps: First, you will come up with a **proposal (20 points, 2 percent)**, which will consist of a case study topic (of your choice), write a research problem statement, theoretical framework, and a research question(s) that you will ask about the topic to be further explored.

This first project will be evaluated and must be approved by the instructor before moving on to the **outline assignment (40 points, 7 percent)**. The outline assignment consists of locating academic or news resources, and then organizing research into a logical essay in which you paraphrase research and utilize proper citations (APA 7th edition citation style). Next, you will prepare a **presentation about the case study (50 points, 7 percent)**. You will have the option of presenting in class (dates will be assigned) or a recorded presentation. You must also provide peer feedback (**competition grade, 1 percent**) that consists of full sentences, paragraphs, and a complete title page and reference page using APA format. The full research paper will be between 6-8 pages (double-spaced) in length (references extra). Specific information about this assignment will be provided and discussed in class.

Midterm and Final Exam

The midterm will consist of multiple choice, fill-in-the-blanks, matching, and short essay questions. The final exam will be a take-home exam that will open the day after the last scheduled classes and close by 11:59 pm on the date scheduled by the registrar. Further details will be provided when available. Reviews before the exams will take place in class.
