**CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:** Sociological analysis of the changing nature, content, and meaning of work; the diversity of industrial contexts and organizational forms, the underlying economic forces (including global) that shape work and work contexts; and the consequences for individuals and society from Canadian and comparative perspectives.

CREDIT/CONTACT HOURS: 3 (3-0-0) UT 45 hours

**DELIVERY MODE(S):** lectures, class discussion, group work, class presentations, written tests, written and oral projects

**OUTCOMES:** Students will learn about the influence work and labour has on our personal lives and society in regards to standard of living, personal identity, health, happiness, relationships, and the way we spend our time. Students will become familiar with topics like organizational design, employee-employer relations, industrial psychology, labour market economics. Students will learn about the many

different kinds of work/occupations as well as the meaning and future of work and employment in a global and post-modern economy.

## **STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:**

**EXAMS** will consist of glossary terms/concepts to define, and/or short essay questions based on all lecture and text materials.

The **DAILY CURRENT EVENTS ANALYSIS** involves selecting a current Canadian media story on any aspect of work, labour markets, jobs and employment, etc., and presenting a short analysis (to generate class discussion) tied into information in our textbook. The **DAILY CHAPTER SECTION DISCUSSION** involves presenting and commenting (to generate class discussion) on the contents of a section of a chapter we are currently on, e.g. Chapter 3, page 37-38, "Scientific Management and Fordism."

The PROPOSAL and ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY is a clear statement (2-3 pages) of field research on a work setting with which you may have experience (e.g. business office, oil patch, retail, warehouse, industrial, IT firm, volunteer, etc.), and your choice of issue/topic you wish to examine in the context of that particular workplace. Notice that Chapters 11 to 17 of the Adams and Welsh text are on different "kinds" of work; a particular chapter will therefore serve as the foundation/basis for your project (e.g. service work [chapter 13], non-standard work [chapter 15], etc., though I'm hoping no one will use criminal work [chapter 17] as the basis for their project © . The bibliography will consist of a minimum of 8 books and/or peer-reviewed journal articles that you intend to use to research your chosen topic.

The **PRESENTATION** and **CLASS HANDOUT** involves a 40-50 minute formal class presentation based on your chosen issue/topic. You will also prepare a 1-2 page fact sheet summarizing your presented topic, to be distributed to your classmates. The

sheet should include relevant facts, findings, statistics (if applicable), including several 'recommended' readings.

#### **ATTENDANCE AND EXAM POLICIES:**

Attendance at lectures is strongly encouraged, as is your participation in class discussions. In addition –

- 1. More than <u>3</u> absences (without medical or other *legitimate* documentation, etc.) could result in being barred from writing the final exam
- 2. All exams, averaged (where applicable), must have a passing mark to obtain a passing grade in the course; otherwise, the final mark shall be 'F'

#### **PLEASE NOTE:**

- Missed exams cannot be accommodated *unless* the situation is an unexpected personal or family emergency for which both can be documented.
- What the semester course work entails will be discussed in detail as classes get underway and as the course progresses.
- For the semester course work students will work individually.

Late course work (or any assignment/course component) will result in a deduction of 5% PER DAY, up to and including the day of a late submission. Assignments will not be accepted after 2 days <u>unless</u> immediate or prior arrangements based on exceptional circumstances have been made. Documented personal or family emergencies will, of course, be accommodated.


