**CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:** This course is designed to create an inquiry-based approach to the critical examination of social welfare programs. - 1. Have knowledge of how social work contributes to a social welfare state.
- 2, Identify social work as a helping profession situated in an ethical framework
- 3. Evaluate personal suitability to practice social work.
- 4. Have knowledge of income security programs in Canada and Alberta.

- 5. Recognize the unique challenges and celebrations of social work practice in a rural, northern, and Indigenous context.
- 6. Articulate the connections between the personal, professional, and political.

At the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. articulate an understanding of social work practice in Canada.
- 2. demonstrate the historical and modern trends of social welfare programs and their connection to political and policy perspectives.
- 3. actively engage in advocacy/actions that challenge aspects of the current delivery of social welfare programs.
- 4. apply different theoretical perspectives to social welfare programs.
- 5. situate social issue trends in Canada within the Global economy.
